CHANGING CHOCOLATE

ISA LONDON NORTH SWIMMING GALA

On Saturday 12th October, twelve pupils competed in the ISA London North Swimming Gala at the impressive Barnet Copthall Leisure Centre. All individual races were over 50m distances and sadly there was no time for relays as the late afternoon was devoted to secondary pupils. Two pupils narrowly missed out on medals, Seren

coming 4^{th} in the Year 5 breaststroke, whilst Benicio was 4^{th} in the Year 4 backstroke but there were some notable successes and six medals were claimed – all by the same family!

Kaelan was 2nd in the Year 4 breaststroke and tied for the bronze in the freestyle. Kyran won the Year 6 breaststroke and came 2nd in the backstroke whilst Kai won gold the two remaining Year 6 events, the freestyle and butterfly.

This clutch of six individual medals represents the best Avon House performance at the event and will culminate in the boys swimming for London North in the National Finals at the Olympic pool in Stratford on November 29th.

Good luck and well done to all who swam and represented the school so creditably on Saturday.



COLLABORATIVE CREATIVE QUILT

Year 2 and Year 6 pupils joined forces over Black History Month on a collaborative creative quilt project inspired by the book 'The Patchwork Path: A Quilt Map to Freedom.'

A powerful and moving story that educates children about the Underground Railroad and the unique role quilts played in guiding slaves toward liberty.

Looking closely at real-life examples of images stitched to quilts and their hidden messages, Year 2 chose their design, glued and stitched the edges.

Passing the squares to Year 6, our older pupils carefully and patiently stitched them together to create the finished piece.



CREATING AN EIFFEL TOWER

On Thursday, Year 2 spent an exciting afternoon learning all about France! Miss Neal spoke to the children about her experience learning French and living in two cities in France. As it was a drama lesson too, we decided to link this into our cultural afternoon by doing some mime! Mr Reed talked about how important it was to act slowly and with intention, exaggerating movements so the meaning is clear. The children mimed being stuck in a glass box, lifting

down some heavy plates (which unfortunately broke!) and taking a dog for a walk.

Miss Neal then read the children the story of Cinderella in French (Cendrillon), and the children had fun learning some new words and hearing the familiar story in another language!

We finished the afternoon by



creating an Eiffel Tower out of spaghetti and marshmallows! The children had to work in teams to construct the tower, carefully following the shape of the real tower and making sure it could stand up on its own.

A FOCUS ON INDIA

For Thursday's cultural day, Year 3 spent time sharing our cultures and heritage with one another. In the afternoon, we studied our focus country, which was India. As part of this, we looked at what school is like for children in two different regions of India. We compared their experience of school with our own. It was very surprising to learn that in Mumbai, there is a huge culture of school lunch delivery services, where people pick up carefully cooked lunches from homes and travel for miles to safely hand them over to children in schools!

We then explored the Hindi writing system and carefully traced and copied letters and numbers using pens. To finish our celebration of India, the children learnt what a mandala is and then used their creativity to design their own.

POETRY SKILLS IN YEAR 5

Year 5 brushed up on their poetry skills this week in their English lessons, looking at Haiku and Tankas; Japanese forms of poetry. They began the week by reading a selection of Haikus and Tankas, which they then

annotated to compare structural similarities and differences. The children realised Haikus follow a 5-7-5 syllable structure whereas Tankas follow a slightly longer 5-7-5-7-7 syllable structure. The children were then tasked with creating their own Haiku and Tanka based around our class book, Diver's Daughter. Some found it challenging to be so selective with their words to follow the syllabic requirements of each line!

Isla 5KI: "I prefer Haikus because there isn't usually a set theme to follow, whereas Tanka's must have a theme of either love or nature!".

Sebastian 5KI: "I also enjoyed Haikus because they can be about anything you want and the name sounds very ancient to me!"

We are looking forward to more fun together after half term break.


WORLD NURSERY RHYME WEEK

It probably comes as no surprise that we are huge fans of nursery rhymes at Avon House with our daily Motor Movers already in place for Early Years.

There is a vast number of benefits they bring to early childhood development.

Here are 5 ways that rhymes can support children's language development:

- Improved listening skills: Rhymes help children to develop their listening skills by encouraging them to focus on the sounds of words (the phonemes) and how they are put together. This can then help them to better understand spoken language when learning to talk.
- Enhanced phonological awareness: Phonological awareness is the ability to hear and manipulate the sounds of language. Rhymes help children to develop this skill by highlighting the patterns of sounds in words.
- Increased vocabulary: Rhymes often introduce children to new words. This can help to expand their vocabulary and to improve their understanding of language. Rhymes often use descriptive language as well as key components of language such as alliteration, similes and



onomatopes.

• Improved memory: Rhymes are often repetitive, which can help children to remember the words and phrases they hear. This can help to improve their memory skills and to make it easier for them to learn and retain new information.

• Increased creativity: Rhymes can inspire children to be creative and to use their imaginations. This can lead to a number of benefits, including improved problem-solving skills, increased self-expression and the confidence to engage in creative role-play activities.
