IT'S GOOD TO THINK!



It has been an electric week in Year 6 as pupils have been constructing circuits from the technical drawings that they had been given. This week, we have also been looking into the life of Anne Frank, planning our Evacuee journey tale and tackling the tricky topic of subtracting fractions with different denominators! Finally, in preparation for our whole school assembly on Anti-Bullying, pupils had been creating THINK posters to be displayed around the school. These posters help us to consider whether what we are about to say in True, Helpful, Inspiring, Necessary or Kind and if any of the answers to this is no - we should not be saying these things. Food for thought for us all this weekend.

REVERSIBLE AND IRREVERSIBLE CHANGES

Year 5 have been enjoying their new topic of reversible and irreversible changes in science this half term, namely because of the amount of investigations they have and will be partaking in!

In our first lesson, the pupils learnt about the process of dissolving and then conducted an investigation to test whether salt, sugar, sand, porridge and flour were soluble or insoluble substances by stirring them into water.

Then, they learnt about how to separate mixtures by filtering and sieving. Another exciting investigation commenced and the children worked in pairs to sieve and filter mixtures to determine the most effective way of separating them. The children have now expanded their vocabulary to include words such as turbid and suspension which are now commonly mentioned in our scientific discussions and observations!



REMEMBRANCE DAY

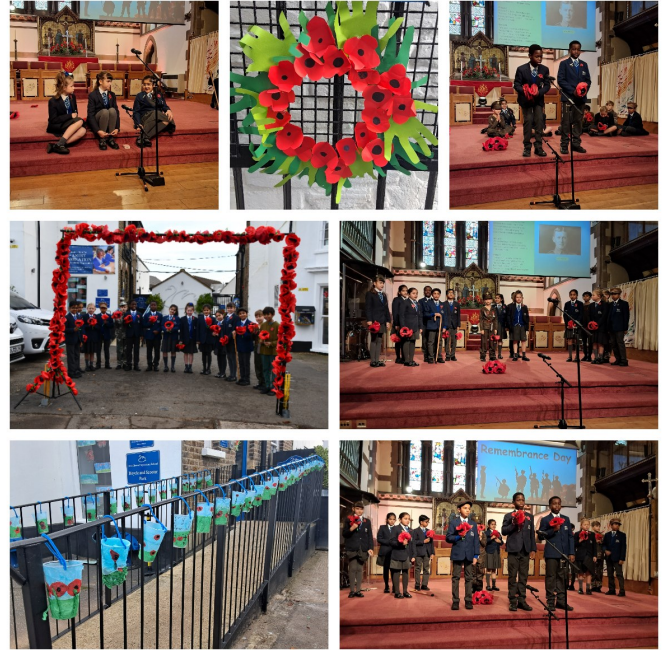

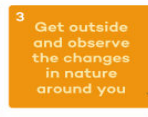
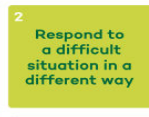

PADDINGTON PERUVES TO BE A HIT!

On Friday 8th of November, Avon House School went to see *Paddington in Peru* on its first day in cinemas, as well as having a Q&A with one of the script writers.

In order to fit in with the busy schedule, the assembly was stripped back to the “bear” essentials – just enough time for Lucas and Seb to provide us with key information about *Paddington* – named after the station that Michael Bond the creator found the lost bear.

No sooner had we finished assembly, then it was to the bus stop and a 10 minute ride to the cinema. To our surprise, we were directed into Screen 1, where we had the whole cinema to ourselves. Mr Babra, quickly put his coat down on a “Premier Seat.” With fruit snacks consumed, the lights were dimmed and *Paddington 3* flickered into life.

It was really interesting to discover more about Peru and that some people speak Spanish there. There were lots of funny moments including, when *Paddington* went to the photobooth to do his passport photo and his face was slammed on the glass sideways with his tongue sticking out! The acting was really good and pupils wanted to know how they made *Paddington* look real by using special effects – maybe this was going to be a question for our special guest. Overall, the cinema goers gave the film a 4.5 star review, with the feeling that it had too much adventure and not quite enough laughs.

Following a lunch that included a delicious marmalade inspired bread and butter pudding (with chocolate sauce), it was out on to The Green for a marmalade hunt and the all-important photo opportunity with *Paddington Bear* himself. Although the rumours were circulating about who was *Paddington* – like a marmalade sandwich, we will keep this one under our hats.

Finally, we had the opportunity to have a Question and Answer session with Mr Lamont, a screen writer on the *Paddington 3* movie. Pupils were impressed with all the work that he has been involved in and were amazed that the film script had 100s of changes even up to the launch day. We got the opportunity to see original images of the script, story board and even discovered what scenes and characters did not make the final cut. Mr Lamont also took the opportunity to discuss his journey with dyslexia, encouraging and inspiring all pupils to not to be held back in the pursuit of their dreams.

BOSSY VERBS

Year 1 Pelicans and Cranes started the week in English by following a set of instructions to create a cup and ball toy. As they worked, they verbally identified the bossy verbs and time connectives in the text. Later, they worked as a class to recreate the instructions and at the end of the week, wrote their own instructions.

Letong said, "I had to scrunch the foil, that was easy. It's not easy to get the ball in the cup. That's hard. Scrunch is a funny bossy verb!"

In Science, Year 1 explored the concept of freezing and melting in a hands-on investigation.

They were tasked with rescuing small toys frozen in blocks of ice, this allowed Year 1 to observe melting in real time and explore different methods for freeing the toys. They were given various toys and materials to try and were encouraged to make predictions around how it may work.

Each child recorded their results by drawing pictures and describing what they noticed in their science book.

Theia spoke about trying to save her toy, "I used a toy saw but it didn't work then I warmed the toy in my hand and it worked better to break the ice up."



YEAR 2 VISIT TO FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE MUSEUM

This week, Year 2 were very lucky to be able to visit the Florence Nightingale Museum in central London. After a journey on the Underground, we had lovely sunny views of Big Ben, the Houses of Parliament and the London Eye.

In the museum, we met Florence Nightingale herself, who told us her fascinating story about her early life and how she transformed hospitals during the Crimean War. The children could remember what they had already learned about Florence during our humanities lessons and participated really well in the workshop, playing lots of different jobs to help Florence in the Scutari Hospital! We were interested to learn that all the paintings of Florence depicted her with a candle lamp, but in fact she carried a Turkish lamp called a fanoos.

We had the opportunity to walk around the museum, looking for special objects that were important to Florence, like her pet owl Athena and the Scutari Hospital sash. The children were able to

dress up in soldiers' and nurses' uniforms, and saw Florence's bedroom from her later life. Florence then taught the children the similarities and differences between nurse's uniforms and equipment in Victorian times compared with today. It was an extremely informative day and the children behaved excellently!

Zavaar said, "My favourite part was dressing as a Crimean soldier."

Aaila said, "I didn't know about Florence's lamp before."

Raphael said, "I liked looking through the little windows to see the pictures and listening to the sound clips."



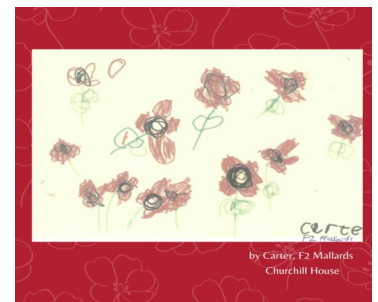
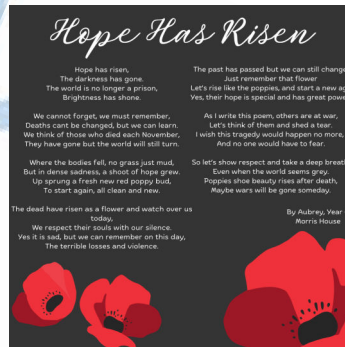
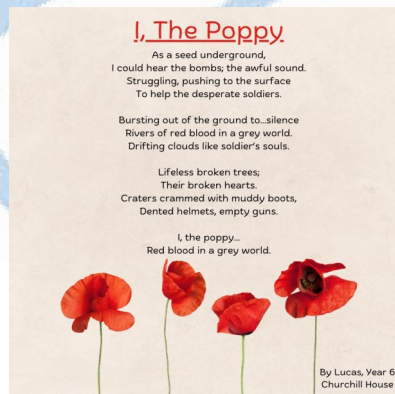
INTER HOUSE POETRY COMPETITION WINNERS

STRING CLUB VISIT TO THE BARBICAN LSO

On Thursday, Strings Club travelled to the Barbican to watch the London Symphony Orchestra (LSO) perform Gustav Holst's 'The Planets.' This is a seven-movement suite and each movement is named after a planet in the Solar System and its astrological character.

The movements are:

Mars, the Bringer of War

Venus, the Bringer of Peace

Mercury, the Winged Messenger

Jupiter, the Bringer of Jollity

Saturn, the Bringer of Old Age

Uranus, the Magician

Neptune, the Mystic



The LSO presented 'The Planets' in a fun and educational way. The children were given the opportunity to clap rhythms, sing and use actions to accompany tunes. It was very inspiring to see professional musicians at work, using the same bowing, as well as watching the discipline they bring to the music. 2024 also happens to celebrate 150 years since Holst was born!

Imogen (6JM) says, "It was very fun and interesting to watch the professional orchestra play the music. I will now try to do the correct bowing when I play because it looks neater when everyone does the same."

CONSTRUCTING CHARIOTS

In Design and Technology this week, Year 3 started to construct their chariots that they have been planning and researching over the past few weeks. They used card and lolly sticks to create a base, deciding on the size that they wanted their chariot to be. After that, they used lengths of wood to carefully measure a surround for their base, before using saws to cut their wood to length in pairs. Then, to create an elaborate design for the box of the chariot, the children decorated pieces of card that will be curved around the base. We can't wait to see the finished product!



COLD AS ICE

This week, Year 4 conducted an investigation to measure how long it takes ice cubes to melt at different temperatures. They were able to ensure it was a fair test, using timers and thermometers to record their results.

Aubrey said, "I didn't expect the temperature of the cold water to drop down from 21 to 18 deg C."

Harpreet agreed and said, "I'm so amazed, I didn't know that it would take more than 6 minutes for ice to melt in cold water."

Meanwhile, in Maths, some children took their learning outside to measure and calculate the area of shapes with given lengths.
